Implementation

History teaching and learning is linked to the school theme, and class 'big question'. The content of the curriculum is mapped out across the year, to ensure full coverage. We expect teachers to take the History learning outdoors as much as possible. Everything is taught within a relatable context and, where possible, first hand experiences are given.

History is taught through other ICB subjects e.g. SMSC, Music, Art and Design, Science

Every student visits at least one London museum across the year.

We track the learning from Y1-Y6 using knowledge and skills progression ladders.
